DD. HEAD, SAFETY AND POLLUTION CONTROL OFFICE (SPCO)

1. REFERENCE

- a. Appointment: The Head of Safety and Pollution Control is appointed by the University President in consultation with the Advisory Board and subject to confirmation by the Board of Trustees.
- b. Qualifications: The Head of Safety and Pollution Control Office must:
 - i. possess at least a master's degree;
 - ii. be a certified pollution control officer and Safety Officer II; and
 - iii. be of good moral character.
- c. Term of Office: The term of office is one year for the initial appointment, renewable for terms of two years each, provided that such appointment shall not be beyond 60 years old, unless the University President extends it on a yearly basis but not beyond the mandatory retirement age of 65.

- **2. FUNCTIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES**: The Head of Safety and Pollution Control Office is directly responsible to the Vice President for Administration and is mandated to perform the following:
- a. oversees the implementation of the Pollution Control Program and Occupational Safety and Health (OSH) Program in coordination with the OSH Committee;
- conducts Pollution Control and OSH orientation and training to employees, students, concessionaires, janitorial and security staff;
- c. regularly monitors and inspects any pollution, health and safety conditions in the university campuses, informs the head of the unit concerned regarding violations and submits written reports to the Vice President for Administration;
- d. conducts investigation of pollution and safety -related accidents in the university campuses when such event occurs and prepares reports of the same as required by the OSH and EMB;
- e. issues Work Stoppage Order when necessary based on the requirements and procedures provided by the OSH and pollution control standards;
- f. assists government inspectors in the conduct of pollution control, health and safety inspection in the university campuses;
- g. prepares the required Pollution Control, OSH and Crisis Management Committee (CMC) reports and permits to the appropriate regulatory government agencies;
- coordinates fire and earthquake drills and other activities with the safety and DRMM coordinators in the basic education levels and prepares reports;
- monitors compliance to waste segregation and disposal guidelines;
- ensures the regular upkeep of fire safety equipment and devices; and
- k. performs other related tasks that may be assigned by the Vice President for Administration or the University

- 6. Regularly inspects and submits reports to the University President regarding the safety and security assurance of the University and immediately after every calamity or disaster.



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3rd Quarter Nationwide Simultaneous Earthquake Drill

Saint Mary's University employees and students actively participated in the 3rd Quarter Nationwide Simultaneous Earthquake Drill on September 7, 2023 (Thursday).

Before the actual drill, Dr. John G. Tayaban, Vice President for Administration as the chairman and Incident Commander conducted a short orientation to the Committee on Campus Safety and Disaster Preparedness and disseminated the information about the occurrence of earthquake as well as the need to carry out drills to enhance the employees and students awareness of the safety measures before, during, and after the earthquake.

At exactly 2:00 in the afternoon, a loud siren noise was sounded all over the campus to signal the start of the drill. employees and students were tasked to perform the "Duck, Cover and Hold" followed by an emergency evacuation to Saint Mary's University Oval (evacuation area).

In the drill, several scenarios were simulated simultaneously. A fire was reported in front of the four pillars and one of the employees (staff) demonstrated the proper use of fire extinguisher. In addition, two people suffered injuries at the Jubilee Library and Tanchoco building, which were pulled out by the Rescue Team (Marian-Emergency Response Team). The Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Team together with the SMU-Safety Officers depicted a rescue operation and school building inspection to ensure the safety of all employees and students. At exactly 2:15 in the afternoon, the Incident Commander declared that the buildings were already safe to occupy, and the resumption of classes was directed to continue.


The drill was followed by a meeting attended by those in charge of the activity together with the external evaluators to discuss observations. FO1 Ma. Fatima Maggay, from BFP Bayombong as the Chairman of evaluators, announced a very satisfactory (82) as overall rating of the said drills.

The Said activity is in pursuant with the Memorandum Order No. 225, series of 2023 enjoining higher education institutions to NSED.

Finally, it was indeed a success. Preparedness and mitigation are the key strategies in reducing disaster risk.

NATIONWIDE SIMULTANEOUS EARTHQUAKE DRILL (NSED)

Pursuant to CHED Region 2 Memorandum Order No. 255, series of 2023 enjoining Higher Education Institutions to participate in the 3rd quarter Nationwide Simultaneous Earthquake Drill (NSED) set for September 7, 2023, the University will participate in the earthquake drill as part of our preparation for disasters.

All persons in campus shall properly execute the earthquake drill protocols especially the DUCK-COVER-HOLD when the alarm is sounded, then quickly and safely evacuate to the assembly areas. Our performance will be assessed on the following items listed below:

PART I - GENERAL EVALUATION:

- 1. The alarm system used is loud enough to be heard by all drill participants.
- The drill participants executed the "duck, cover, and hold" technique during the Alarm Phase or while the alarm system is being sounded.
- The drill participants waited for the alarm system to stop before evacuating.
- 4. The drill participants executed the "buddy-buddy" system (walk by pairs) during the evacuation phase.
- The drill participants walked faster than normal during the evacuation phase.
- 6. The drill participants followed their evacuation routes to the evacuation area/s.
- The drill participants covered their heads while vacating the building.
- 8. The participants checked for any sustained injury in the evacuation/assembly areas.
- 9. A headcount was conducted while in the evacuation area.
- 10. The participants stayed in the evacuation area until the drill was terminated.

PART II. EVALUATION OF THE DISASTER CONTROL GROUP

- 1. The Ground Commander established clear leadership during the drill.
- The Medical Team immediately addressed all medical needs of the injured victims and casualties.
 - The Search and Rescue Team was efficiently organized in responding to the incident.
- 4. The Fire Safety Team demonstrated proper fire suppression.
- 5. The Evacuation Team properly executed the evacuation procedures.
- 6. The Security Team adequately secured the perimeter for the drill area
- 7. The Building Team observed protocols in ensuring the building safety before re-entering.
- The Communication Team utilized the equipment properly during the coordination and execution of response operations.
- 9. The Transportation Team ensured the availability of vehicles.

Let us embrace preparedness today for a resilient future.

Saint Mary's University Bayombong, Nueva Vizcaya Campus Safety And Disaster Preparedness EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS PLAN INSTITUTIONAL

CHAPTER I: AUTHORITY

- a. CHED Memorandum Circular No.09 s. 2013;
- b. PDRRM Act of 2010 RA 10121

CHAPTER II. RATIONALE

Aside from the mandate of the Commission on Higher Education Memorandum Circulars and Existing Rules and Regulations of Regulating Agencies, Saint Mary's University in pursuit of its mission and vision adopts the following procedures to arouse awareness and consciousness of its stakeholders on the emergency procedures in case of earthquake, fire , flooding, typhoon or bomb threat incidents and other emergency situations . The procedures are designed to reduce the risk of injuries/death and to minimize property damages in case of these emergencies.

The teams involved must be aware of their respective duties and functions in order to have coordinated activities during emergency situations.

CHAPTER III RESPONSIBILITIES OF SMU DISASTER RISK REDUCTION MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE Chairperson:

- 1. Shall convene the committee as needed to effectively coordinate the efforts on disaster preparedness emergency operation and recovery and rehabilitation activities
- 2. Shall call on all concerned office, agencies and instrumentalities of the government and Civil Society Organizations for their assistance when needed

Assistant Chairperson

- Assist the chairperson
- Perform the duties of the Chairman in her/his absence

Team Leader

• Serves as the Head of the assigned Team and give instruction to the Team members as per ordered by the Chairperson/Assistant Chairperson or act for him/her in his/her absence and perform such duties the Chairman/Assistant Chairman may assigned

First Aid Team

- Keeps the first aid kit ready at all times
- The members of the Medical and Rescue Team shall set an accommodating environment for the clientele
- Provide all needed materials and services for the victim's fast recovery

Evacuation & Rescue Team

- In case of emergency the Evacuation Team shall quickly alert all building occupants and direct them in getting out of the vicinity to the designated emergency exit.
- Organize them to the designated evacuation area
- The members of the team should conduct final and quick check of rooms and offices to ensure that all occupants have vacated the place and buildings
- · Quickly conduct head counts at the evacuation area
- Other related works requested by the Chairman

Communication & Information Team

- In case of emergency, the Communication Team shall notify the School Officials, personnel and teachers regarding the status and situation of the calamity using any available means of communication
- The team leader or members shall activate the alarm system of the school to give emergency signal to all occupants
- Relay important information to the different teams
- Follow-up the call to the local Rescue units, BFP and PNP,
- Update bulletin boards, reports and other information materials, leaflets, fliers and other necessary materials
- Other related works requested by the Chairman

Transportation Team

- Get ready for all transportation equipment
- Responsible for the transport needs

- Determine the transportation needs and requirements
- Other related works requested by the Chairman

Site and Security Team

- Provides security to all evacuees, victims, and the whole area from looting
- Does other related work requested by the Chairman

Logistic, Damage and Control Team

- Check for any possible victim to be identified for proper tagging (*Red*: Severely injured, *Orange*: mildly injured, *Green*: Tolerable)
- Record all injured victims
- Having done with the injured people, the team needs to check too the affected area for reporting

Fire Brigade Team

- Go to the affected area as instructed by the Chairperson for the initial fire-fighting operations
- Report any outcome to the Chairperson

Supply Team

- Make an inventory of all equipment and medicines ready for use in case of emergency
- report to the Chairperson any lacking materials for appropriate action
- Issue the requested materials needed by the first aid team as approved by the Chairperson
- Counter check the inventory of materials after the event

Evacuation and Recovery Team

- Ensure the security and safety of the school populace
- Bring the identified victims in the recovery section of the school for proper action
- Assists the paramedics in case services are needed

Search and Rescue Team

- The sweepers will go around the school to check for possible victims as well as students who are trapped and need help
- Report to the Incident Command Post (ICP) for immediate action

Chapter IV OPERATION PROCEDURES

General Operation

- A. Population at risk will be evacuated in accordance to procedures established by the CSDP Committee
- B. Priorities shall be determined prior to rescue and evacuation efforts.
- C. Rescue and evacuation shall be done as a necessity and as a major responsibility of the CSDP Committee
- D. The Chairperson shall call the evacuation order and executes other necessary actions need.
- E. The Assistant Chairperson calls the shots for evacuation in the absence of the Chairperson.
- F. The sweepers of the CSDP act as the overseers for the whole area.

Phases Of Operation

Phase I (Preparatory Stage)

- A. Re-organization/Re-activation of SMU CSDP Committee.
- B. Information dissemination from SMU CSDP Committee to students, faculty and staff, parents and nearby occupants from the school.
- C. Undertake all necessary preparation as required in the plan.
- D. Organization and provision of specialized training on disaster response team.
- E. Massive information drive and education campaign.
- F. Improvement of communication and warning system.
- G. Conduct of evacuation drills and exercise.
- H. Updating of contingency and evacuation plans.
- I. Development of an effective disaster response at the lower level.
- J. Improvement of the monitoring and feedback mechanism.

Phase II

(Disaster Period)

- A. Full activation of the SMU CSDP Committee and its other linkages
- B. Provision of emergency services such as relief, rescue and evacuation, transportation, emergency and medical care and communication warning.
- C. Provision of timely information on actual disaster incidents.


- D. Conduct of situation survey and damage assessment.
- E. Close monitoring and supervision on the different teams for possible support and assistance.
- F. Submission of reports.

Phase III

(Post Disaster Period)

- A. Conduct SMU CSDP Committee meeting for final evaluation of the situation.
- B. Determine rehabilitation requirements for disaster victims.
- C. Preparation of final report.
- D. Restoration, repair and rehabilitation of damaged infrastructure.
- E. Conduct post disaster assessment and review the existing plan

Levels of Emergency Alert Status





I. EMERGENGY PREPAREDNESS PLAN

A. WHAT TO DO IN CASE OF EARTHQUAKE

1. Procedures

- a. If indoors, seek refuge in a doorway, or under a desk or table.
- b. Watch out for falling objects.
- c. Keep calm and don't panic.
- d. Listen to the teacher's instructions.
- e. Walk out of the classroom in an orderly manner.
- f. While walking along the corridors to the nearest exit of the building, be alert and look out for falling debris.
- g. Quietly but quickly proceed to the designated evacuation area for the class and wait for further instructions from the teacher.
- h. NEVER go back to the building once you are outside. Buildings shall be inspected by engineers for possible damage after an earthquake. Basic Education students should stay in the open area and wait for their parents/guardians to pick them up.
- i. If outdoors, move quickly away from buildings and other structures.

- j. If in an automobile, stop in the safest place available, preferably away from power lines, structures and trees.
- k. For the teacher/head of office, make sure all students/personnel are accounted for in the designated evacuation area.

DON'T RUN, DON'T SHOUT, DON'T PUSH.

2. Phases of an Earthquake Drill

Phase 1. Alarm

A pre-arranged signal such as a siren/bell should be known to all. During the drill, the siren/bell indicates earthquake or shaking. Students and employees will be alerted by this signal.

Phase 2. Response

While the siren/bell is ongoing, everyone should move away from windows, glass or light fixtures. In this phase, everyone should perform "duck, cover and hold" under desks, tables or chairs. Remain in this position until the "shaking" stops.

Phase 3. Evacuation

Once the "shaking" stops, everyone should evacuate the school building and proceed, using predetermined routes, to identified evacuation areas.

Phase 4. Assembly

At the designated evacuation area, students must be grouped together according to the class where they belong.

Phase 5. Head Count

Teachers should check and make sure all students and staff are accounted for. and Heads of offices

Phase 6. Evaluation

An evaluation of the drill must be conducted to identify problems encountered during the drill and how this can be corrected in future earthquake drills.

3. Earthquake Drill Situations/Assumptions

- a. An earthquake might happen at any time when students and employees are inside the buildings and premises. Earthquake may cause injury /or loss of lives and damage properties due to its shaking effect and of falling objects. Students or occupants may rush in securing for their safety. Stampede may occur during this situation.
- b. Fire might occur as a result of accident, nature or incendiary origin within the school campus at any time. Fire may also originate from adjacent

buildings or structures and spread towards the school buildings which poses danger to employees and students.

4. Objectives of an Earthquake Drill

General:

To reduce the risk of injuries and damage to properties.

Specific:

- 1. To arouse consciousness and awareness of the stakeholders as well as the members of the Emergency Response Team of the procedures during emergency situation;
- 2. To execute the procedure in a minimum period or at the fastest time possible;
- 3. To get a maximum beneficial result;
- 4. To be familiarized with the teams' respective responsibilities during emergency situation; and
- 5. To familiarize the stakeholders of the exit and evacuation routes to the evacuation areas.

5. Execution of an Earthquake Drill

A. Before Any Emergency

- 1. A regular review of this emergency procedures shall be done by all the stakeholders and task groups; and
- 2. A drill shall be executed at least four times every school year;

Procedures for Day time Earthquake Drill

1. First Alarm

- a. The Classroom Teachers/Instructors shall immediately direct their students to drop, duck, cover and hold beside their chairs away from glass windows and falling objects;
- b. Immediately, the members of the ERT shall organize themselves in their respective stations and wait for further instruction from the Emergency Ground Commander (EGC);

2. Second Alarm (Situation Temporarily Stabilized)

- a. When the ground shaking is stabilized, the Emergency Ground Commander (EGC) orders evacuation; and
- b. The Evacuation Team and Security Team are activated.

3. Third Alarm (Injuries Noted)

- a. When there is a report of injury, third alarm is immediately raised by the Emergency Ground Commander (EGC); and
- b. The Rescue Team and Medical Team are activated.

Responsibilities of the Person-In-Charge

- 1. **Before the drill**, the person-in-charge takes care of disseminating information regarding Campus Safety and Disaster Preparedness activities.
- 2. Coordinate with the occupants in the building regarding planned drills.
- 3. **During a particular drill**, he/she acts as the team leader in evacuating the building.
- 4. Reports to the Ground Commander (VP for Administration) the status of evacuation (e.g. all occupants were accounted for)
- **5. After the drill,** takes part in the evaluation of the drill conducted together with the members of the Campus Safety and Disaster Preparedness Committee.
- 6. Suggest or recommends actions that must be taken in order to improve the drill as well as the University's preparedness for risks, disasters and natural calamities.

B. WHAT TO DO IN CASE OF FIRE

a. First Alarm (Discovery of Fire)

The first person who notices the fire shall immediately raise the alarm. He/she shall ring the fire bell or buzzer in accordance with the pre-arranged fire incident ring code (1 long and pulsating ringing for at least 30 seconds). He/she shall subsequently report the incident to the nearest guard post. The Security Guard who received the alarm shall immediately notify the Emergency Ground Commander (EGC).

- a. The Emergency Ground Commander upon receipt of the alarm shall alert all the members of the SMU-CSDP Committee and assess the situation;
- b. The team leaders of the respective group shall organize his/her members in their respective station ready for operation upon instruction of the EGC
- c. The firefighting team shall upon receipt of the alarm, immediately proceed to the scene of fire and conduct immediate fire suppression activities using portable fire extinguishers available at all floor levels. The Team Leader shall supervise the firefighting activity and render report to the Emergency Ground Commander'
- d. The EGC shall direct the Communication Team to notify the Fire Department if needed; and
- e. The Security Force (SF) shall post duty guards at the scene not to allow unauthorized persons in the area.

b. Second Alarm (Uncontrolled Fire)

- a. When fire spreads toward adjacent rooms or parts of the building or at the ceiling, upon report of the Fire Fighting Team Leader, the EGC shall raise second alarm. The necessity for occupants to evacuate shall be immediately ordered;
- b. The EGC shall activate the members of the **Evacuation Team (ET)** to lead the occupants to the Evacuation Area, in accordance with the evacuation procedure; and the **Salvage Team (ST)** to bring-out files, documents and other valuables to the Dumping Area, in accordance with the order of priority; and

Salvage Priority

First Priority (Red)

- -Student records
- -Financial records
- -Investigation reports
- -Legal documents
- -Electronic files
- -Cash
- -Other Documents of the same value

Second Priority (Blue)

- -Computer Units
- -Laboratory equipment
- -Cash register machines
- -Other valuables not falling on 1st priority

Third Priority (Yellow or White)

- -School supplies
- -Table and chairs
- -Linen/curtains
- -Other valuables not falling on 2nd priority
- c. Other members of Security Team shall be posted at the Evacuation Area and Dumping Area.

c. Third Alarm (Injuries Noted)

- a. When injuries were reported as a result of the fire or rushing of occupants in the course of evacuation, upon report of the Evacuation Team Leader, the Emergency Ground Commander shall raise third alarm.
- b. The EGC shall activate the Rescue Team (RT) and the Medical Team (MT) to respond immediately at the scene and perform their respective functions.
- c. The Rescue Team shall assess the condition of the victims and if necessary, first aid shall be done in accordance with the rescue and first aid procedures before bringing the victims to the Medical Area where the members of the Medical Team are stationed to extend immediate medical attention and proper disposition; and
- d. Other members of the Security Team shall also be dispatched at the Medical Station;

At any time of the operation, when the members of the fire department arrive, the authority of the Emergency Ground Commander ceases and the responsibility shall be turned over to the most senior fire officer who arrives at the fire scene and same shall assume responsibility as the Fire Ground Commander.

At any time, in the absence of the Fire Ground Commander, when the situation is stabilized, the Emergency Ground Commander may declare the situation "UNDER CONTROL".

C. WHAT TO DO IN CASE OF FLOODS?

- **1.** Students in the ground floor should go up to the second floor.
- 2. The Committee on Campus Safety and Disaster Preparedness of the University will direct the subsequent operations to the different team leaders.

- 3. property evacuation team helps in carrying valuable instruments like computer and scientific instruments to the second floor
- 4. Upon direction of the Emergency Ground Commander, the Security Team directs people from nearby communities to the gym which will serve as Center of operation during floods.

D. WHAT TO DO IN CASE OF TYPHOONS OR HEAVY RAINS OR STRONG WINDS

- 1. The University shall follow the directives of the local LGU (Municipal or Provincial) on suspension of classes and /or work if the order includes private schools.
- 2. The University President may order suspension of classes and/or work upon recommendation of the CSDP and AB based on the local weather condition.
- 3. When Typhoon signal No. 1 is raised over Bayombong, classes in grade school is suspended. Teachers, administrators and staff shall work in campus.
- 4. When Typhoon signal No. 2 is raised over Bayombong, classes in junior high school and senior high school shall be suspended. Teachers, administrators and staff shall work in campus complete non-teaching tasks.
- 5. When Typhoon signal No. 3 is raised over Bayombong, classes and work in all levels shall be suspended.

E. WHAT TO DO WHEN EMERGENCY HAPPENS IN THE NIGHT

- a. IMMEDIATE ACTION
 - a.1 Security Guard (Main Gate), calls the officers/persons concerned:
 - Fire Department
 - Police Department
 - MDRRO
 - CICM fathers in CICM House
 - VP Administration
 - Security guards in all campuses and dorms
 - -other in-campus residents (ex. guests)
 - a.2. VP Administration calls emergency team leaders:
 - -Building Supervisor
 - -Head, PPDMO
 - -Coordinator, NSTP

- a.3. Coordinator, NSTP calls ROTC officers to proceed to place of emergency to secure premises and properties.
- a.4. Dorm Master in Male dormitory mobilizes the employees and students in dorm to proceed to area of emergency.

b. IN CASE OF FLOOD

- b.1 Roving guard
- gets the keys (from the University Housekeeper/Security Guard) to the offices affected
 - -shuts off the main electric switch
- -divides Male dormers into groups to detach computers in the offices to bring them to the second floor and lock them in for security and safety.

b.2. Security Guards

- -Upon approval of the VPA, direct people from the community who are affected by the flood to the bleachers in the SMU Tonus Gym
- -make sure that all male dormers and people in the campus are accounted for and are safe.
 - -coordinate operation with authorities in the area

c. IN CASE OF EARTHQUAKES

- c.1. everybody must seek cover under tables, beds, beams, etc
- c.2. go out to the oval after the first big jolt. A bigger one might be coming
- c.3 in case of big earthquakes, the oval will serve as center of operation and first aid for in-campus residents and neighbors
- c.4. security guards must secure the campus against bad elements who might take advantage of the situation

d. IN CASE OF FIRE

- d.1. Security uses fire extinguisher to put off fire
- d.3. security guard must put off the main electric switch
- d.4. security guard must secure the place and look out for possible looters
- d.5. male dormers should try to save what could be saved from the neighboring rooms without endangering their lives until the fire trucks arrive.

F. After Any Incident

- 1. At the Evacuation Area, the Classroom Teacher/Instructor shall immediately account his/her students;
- 2. Office Heads shall account their respective subordinates;

- 3. Respective Team Leaders of the MERT shall likewise do the same and render report to the EGC; and
 - 4. The EGC shall after receipt of the reports from the members of the Team of the MERT immediately consolidate the data and make an incident report to the President and copies shall be furnished to the BFP, PNP and other government agencies concerned upon request.

Chapter IV. CONCEPT OF OPERATION:

This EPP shall be operational in all buildings and campuses of Saint Mary's University including its Men's and Ladies' dormitories.

This EPP drills shall be executed at least four times every school year and applied during emergency situations.



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Office History

The merging of the Indigenous Knowledge and Tradition (IKAT) Center and the Community Extension and Services Center (CESC) in August 2019 eventually established the so-called Lingkod Maria Community Development and Advocacy Center (LMCDAC). This was primarily done to consolidate all Saint Mary's University community extension services. Lingkod Maria highlights Saint Mary's University's (SMU) brand identity under the Congregatio Immaculati Cordis Mariae (CICM). The term "advocacy" somehow embraces SMU's apostolate for the indigenous peoples – one of the Congregation's priority concerns. Before the merging, the CESC was under Mrs. Alicia Z. Jubay, and the IKAT was under Dr. Darwin Don M. Dacles.

The merging transpired with the solidification of the Vice President for Mission and Identity (VPMI) in CICM Philippine educational institutions, which articulated the desire to come as one body, as one Congregation. It underscores the need to surface in all the activities of CICM institutions the very reason for its existence. The LMCDAC is directly supervised by the Vice President for Mission and Identity. Therefore, the VPMI, through the LMCDAC, ensures the promotion of living out the CICM Catholic Identity and missionary spirituality in the various communities that SMU serves.

The LMCDAC serves as the clearinghouse of all outreach and community extension services of the six major schools and their flagship programs in the University, namely: School of Accountancy and Business (*PABookaS and Entrep sa Barangay*); School of Engineering, Architecture and Information Technology (*Tulungan sa Teknolohiya*); School of Health and Natural Sciences (Jesus Mobile Clinic); School of Teacher Education and the Humanities (*Nanumo nga Pagadalan*); School of Graduate Studies (The GIFTED Program); and the College of Law (Peace, Justice, and Human Rights Program). The apostolate for the indigenous peoples is interwoven in the University's outreach and extension flagship programs. These were the extension flagship programs until AY 2020-2021.

The challenges posed by the covid-19 pandemic brought to life a new extension program in 2020-2021. This program aims to address these challenges ranging from the safety of the front liners and elders to the learning of students/pupils. It is called the *Saranay* Program, which aims to provide aid and assistance. The program's four components are the Mobile Market, *Talged ken Salun-at*, *Tarigagay*, and *Tulong-Dunong*



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Projects. These are innovations to the flagship programs of each School. Henceforth, each project's activities were added to each extension program's portfolio to ensure sustainability. This program was one of the top three finalists during the *Gawad Edukampyon* 2021, organized by the Commission on Higher Education (CHED), Rex Education, and the Philippine Business for Social Progress.

There were changes and realignments in the advocacy and extension flagship programs of different schools/units/departments in 2021. The *Nanumo nga Pagadalan* was turned over to the Grade School Department, which they combined with AKLAT-their existing extension flagship project. The School of Teacher Education and Humanities crafted a new extension flagship project. It is the SILAWAM Project, which stands for Socio-Pastoral Integral Life and Wellbeing Advocacies and Ministry. The extension flagship project of the Junior High School Department is still the Marian Service-Learning System, and the Senior High School Department will lead the Disaster Risk Reduction Program of the University. Hence, the latter's extension flagship project is the KALASAG Project, which stands for *Kaagapay Laban sa Sakuna at Gabay sa Paghahanda*. The Center for Natural Sciences will lead in implementing Sustainable Environment Advocacy. The project is called the Marian Green Service Towards Environmental Protection and Sustainability or the Marian Green STEPS Project. Lastly, the I.P. Advocacy and Development Program is currently led by the IKAT Desk of LMCDAC through the *Dinnāda* Project.

Saint Mary's University has eight advocacy programs with 11 projects with all the above advancements. The eight advocacy programs are I.P. Advocacy and Development (*Dinnāda* Project), Hunger Alleviation (Feed My Lambs Project), Sustainable Environment (Marian Green STEPS), Disaster Risk Reduction (KALASAG Project), Health and Wellbeing (Jesus Mobile Clinic Project), Poverty Alleviation (*Tulungan sa Teknolohiya*, and *PABookAS and Entrep sa Barangay* Projects, Socio-Pastoral Ministry and Evangelization (SILAWAM Project), and Education for All (AKLAT, Marian Service Learning, and GIFTED Projects). The College of Law coordinates with the School of Teacher Education and Humanities for the Peace, Justice, and Integrity of Creation, and at the same time leads in the implementation of their extension flagship project which is the Legal Clinic. These advocacy programs were finalized during the Directorship of Dr. Christopher Allen S. Marquez, and the Research and Community Development Council officially approved these in AY2021-2022, and the Legal Clinic of the College of Law was introduced during the First Semester, 2023-2024.

Saint Mary's University celebrated the Ethnicity and Museum Week last October 23-28, 2023, with the theme: "IP Youth as Agents of Change for Self-Determination." The event started with the Ethnicity Mass at the Tonus Gymnasium, co-sponsored by the School of Accountancy and Business (SAB) Week. Rev. Fr. Crispin A. Costales, the IP Director of the Diocese of Bayombong, was the celebrant, and he emphasized in his homily connectedness and unity amidst cultural diversity.

The opening program was held at the Marian Park, and the blessing of the Museo de Maria was held after the eucharistic celebration on October 23. Dr. Christopher Allen S. Marquez formally opened the week, and Fr. Costales led the blessing of the Museo de Maria. A community dance, led by the BIBAK members, came after the formal opening. Present during the blessing of the Museo de Maria were Dr. John Octavious S. Palina (University



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President), Dr. John G. Tayaban (VP for Administration), Rev. Fr. Philip A. Yu, Jr. (VP for Mission and Identity), Dr. Moises Alexander T. Asuncion (VP for Academic Affairs), the different administrative personnel, faculty, staff, and students.

There were contested activities participated in by the students. In the afternoon of October 23, the painting competition was judged and Miss Erika Noelle A. Lunag emerged as the champion, receiving the grand prize of Php 7,500.00. The essay writing contest in English and Filipino organized by the Junior High School Department. An intercultural and cultural quiz bee was also administered last October 26, 2023, at the San Pedro Calungsod Hall, where participants from SHANS emerged as champions of the two contests. Nineteen delegates from the different dioceses of the Sierra Madre and other representatives across the Philippines joined. Among the participants were from Malolos (6), Nakar (3), Bayombong (1), Zambales (2), and Mindoro (7). During the summit, Rev. Fr. Earl Alan Cura discussed matters on Laudato Si, Mr. Tony Abuso, and Mr. Red Salonga. Meanwhile, the Senior High School Students conducted a Cultural Sensitivity Seminar, and the invited resource speaker was Mrs. Mikara J. Dulay on October 25.

The premiere of the Teatro Katutubo's musical production entitled *Dalaydayan* was staged at the Sacred Heart Center and continued until October 27.

The Ethnicity and Museum Week's end was celebrated with a Community Feast last October 27, 2023, at the Tonus Gymnasium. The extension service provided by the Pharmacy Department is in celebration of the World Pharmacists Day. The theme of the event (WPD) is, "Pharmacy Strengthening Health Systems", to support this, SMU SHANS Pharmacy Department's faculty and students distributed free OTC medicines. Medicines were given to the LDRs, security guards, contract workers and tertiary students in the campus, providing medication counseling as these medicines are given to them. The celebration started with a Mass at the Mary Seat of Wisdom Chapel at 7:15 am, attended by the faculty members of Pharmacy with students from year levels 2, 3 and 4. Dr. Joman Baliton, Dean of SHANS also joined the Eucharistic celebration. A short opening program was held at the UB Park after the mass before the distribution of medicines. The venue for the SMU group is within the university campus.

The activity aims to promote health through rational use of medicines and to provide medicines that will strengthen recipients' immune system amid flu season. The OTC medicines given to the recipients is a ten day supply of MV and ascorbic acid and the paracetamol can be a year supply if this will not be used. The challenge is the sustenance of the MV and ascorbic acid as these medicines should be maintained to ensure better health amongst workers of SMU.

The donors of the medicines were the 31 Junior Pharmacy students. Three hundred packs of the OTC medicines were prepared. Each pack contains 10 tablets of paracetamol, ascorbic acid and multivitamins. The distribution was participated by the 31 Junior Pharmacy students and 44 Sophomore Pharmacy students. Medication counseling was provided as these medicines are given to recipients. Extensionists went around the campus and personally handed the prepared packs of medicines to identified recipients. Total amount of medicine purchased was 6,730.00 (donated by students). Other expenses were



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on the tarpaulin and balloons which amounts to 1,010.00 (c/o project leader).

One group facilitated the seminar on "Livelihood and Skills Training on Wine and Vinegar Making," which took place on September 30, 2023, at Debuscherre Hotel Function Hall, Saint Mary's University, Bayombong, Nueva Vizcaya. The other group is for the October 1 activity on Chayote Quash Pickles livelihood activity.

The group had the opportunity to sponsor the outreach by contributing P200.00 each, for a total of P1,800.00 for the snacks and sharing their knowledge of basic marketing principles. Mr. Neil Jansen O. Reginalde served as the lecturer for the seminar, covering the topic "How to Market a Product: The Ps of Marketing."

In total, there were twenty-six (26) participants, including 11 women from Sitio Masina and 15 women from TIBIK, Inc.

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overall activities held. Transportation of Participants had the lowest rate of 4.23 because there were some delays and issues in the transport of some participants since they came from a remote barrio where communication is unstable but they were immediately fetched. The total average of all criteria shows a high rate of 4.73 which signifies that participants were all satisfied and happy about the overall extension program provided.

According to the comments collected from twenty-six participants, they liked all the activities provided and commended the topic about the 7 Ps of Marketing. Participants suggested more Entrepreneurship training and seminars specifically Mushroom Processing, Packaging, Bookkeeping and Costing.

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

JTHMAP-SMU Chapter Officers facilitates the seminar regarding food safety and sanitation to raise awareness about the importance of food safety practices and proper sanitation in the food industry. The seminar brought together professionals and students from the field of Hospitality industry shares their knowledge and experiences in ensuring the safety and quality of food products.

The previous research on the MSMEs green business practices revealed that they display very good practices in the reduction of power waste and energy saving despite their limited awareness and waste sorting practices and needs further awareness and practice on the following specifically on usage of renewable and natural ingredients and products; green packing, green packaging, and eco-labeling; green building; eco-cleaning; less usage of paperless printing; usage of public transport; and spreading awareness about "green business". The challenges on green business practices also showed that MSMEs have limited knowledge, weak implementation of environmental policies, and expensive cost of adopting green business practices.

Green business practices can be promoted through an engagement with the Department of Trade and Industry in conducting information dissemination activities to MSMEs to heighten their green business practices with emphasis on zero-waste disposal practices and product development, energy saving practices, and inviting an entrepreneur to share his/her implementation of green business practices.

The project was conducted via Zoom (online), and it was scheduled based on the availability of the MSMEs and resource speakers. The target beneficiaries of the program were MSMEs who are into food and non-food products invited by the Department of Trade and Industry, and it was also suggested by Ms. Lenore Lee Lopez, Business Development Division Chief that it is also better to involve would-be entrepreneurs to attend.

Activity 1: Plan Information-dissemination activities on Green Business Practices with the Department of Trade and Industry and identify resource speakers on green business practices (August to September 2023)



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Dr. Harrison T. Villanueva, lead researcher, visited Ms. Rowena F. Mayangat, Former Division Chief, Consumer Protection of the Department of Trade and Industry on August 22, 2023, to present the findings of the study and present the plan of our project. The activities in the plan included inviting an entrepreneur to share her implementation of green business practices, zero waste disposal practices, product development, and energy saving practices.

A follow-up conversation was done on September 18, 2023 to discuss the roles of DTI and SMU as well as the target participants of the webinar. Ms. Mayangat also proposed that the webinar will be conducted in October in celebration of the Consumer Month since the theme is "Gen S: Generation Sustainable".



Activity 2: Conduct of Webinar on Green Business Practices (Entrepreneurs for the Environment: Leading the Green Revolution)

The researchers in collaboration with the Department of Trade and Industry, SMU School of Accountancy and Business and SMU School of Graduate Studies conducted information dissemination activities specifically highlighting entrepreneurs implementing green business practices and conducted lectures on energy saving practices and zero waste disposal practices and product development. The webinar was attended by 17 MSMEs, 80 students, 2 from DTI, and 8 SMU employees.

Topic 1: Lecture on the Energy Saving Practices


The Lecture on Energy Saving Practices was conducted on November 10, 2023. It was originally scheduled on November 3, 2023 but due to unavailability of the MSME-participants it did not push through. The plan was to conduct the activity in October 2023 but due to the hectic schedule of the Department of Trade and Industry it was proposed

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that if possible it will be scheduled on November 2023 after the Consumer Month celebration in October 2023.

Engr. Maximino C. Gabatino III, Technical Staff, Research and Development, Planning and Energy Trading, Nueva Vizcaya Electric Cooperative (NUVELCO) discussed the topic Energy Saving Practices. His topic covered the breakdown of electric bill, simplified computation for Energy, advocacy on green energy, energy reduction and saving practices, and impact on energy conversation. The lecture also highlighted the essence of energy saving which could reduce our carbon footprint and minimize the effects of global warming.






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Topic 2: Conduct Lecture inviting an entrepreneur with Best Green Business Practices and Zero Waste Disposal Practices


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

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Topic 4: Sharing of Green Business Practices, Challenges and Prospects: A SMU-DTI Engagement research



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

November 04, 2023, faculty members and students of the HTM department together with the SAB Dean, Dr. Regina Ramel, and the Community Development and Advocacy Coordinator, Mrs. Rodora Tipay went to Villaverde, Nueva Vizcaya to do a site assessment of the MangKelleb Hill Grotto. This is the preliminary activity to assess the site on the things and areas for improvement as a tourist site being developed by the Parish of Villaverde.

After a few minutes of travel from Bayombong, we reached the entrance point to the hill. There we meet Rev. Fr. Crispin A. Costales, the parish priest of Villaverde and the initiator of the development project of MangKelleb. Along with him are his volunteer companions. We greeted each other and had a picture taken before we started climbing the MangKelleb. Fr. Costalesd mentioned that there is about 200+ steps to reach the cottage area on top. When we arrived at the cottage area, you could see the Stone Crafted Image of Our Lady of Victory. While resting we learned stories about MangKelleb and its rich history. It was mentioned also that it was named after an Ilokano word "Kelleb" which means laid upon or surmounted because of the 2 rocks that were superimposed with each other, which is why they called it MangKelleb. After we get some energy we started climbing again going to the top of this Mountain to see the Cross. While we are climbing we see the majestic view of Villaverde and I can say that Villaverde is the



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right name for this Municipality because of its color green environment. After a few hiking steps, we reached the top and here we saw the view of Villaverde and Bagabag. After a few minutes, we decided to go down and at this time we used the second trail which is the hard one. We were on our way down and saw this astonishing spring between the two stones, it's just like a cave that has water inside, it's rare for me. After a few minute walks, the team rested for a while to catch a breath and discussed some recommendations and suggestions that need to be on this site. The Seminar on Computer Security: A Community Service Learning was held on November 25, 2023 at AP203 (Face to Face – Part 1) and December 2, 2023 via Gmeet (Part 2). The event aimed to increase the awareness of growing cybersecurity threats and challenges facing by individuals and community as a whole and empower the participants about best practices and strategies to protect themselves against cyber threats.

Opening Session:

The seminar commenced with an opening address by Dr. Adonis V. Garces who welcomed the participants and highlighted the significance of addressing the issues and challenges regarding computer security in terms of threats and attacks and how to protect data against cybercrimes. The students of MITF 211 – Computer Security, Control and Algorithms serves as speakers. They shared to the participants what they have learned in the classroom via this seminar.

On topic 1: The topic commenced with an insightful overview of the current cyber threat landscape. Attendees gained a deeper understanding of various cyber threats, including malware, phishing, and ransomware, through real-world examples of recent cyber-attacks. The session also emphasized fundamental security measures, such as the importance of strong passwords, two-factor authentication, and regular software updates.

The topic also presented the fundamentals of access controls. The importance of restricting unauthorized access to sensitive data and systems was emphasized. Participants gained insights into the various types of access controls, such as discretionary access control (DAC), mandatory access control (MAC), and role-based access control (RBAC). Real-world examples illustrated the significance of implementing effective access control measures in different environments.

On topic 2: The topic commenced with an exploration of the human factor in security. Presentations highlighted the role of employees as both assets and potential



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vulnerabilities in an organization's security posture. Discussions covered the importance of fostering a security-aware culture within the workforce and the impact of employee behavior on overall cybersecurity.

It also focused on the crucial phase of employee onboarding and continuous training in maintaining a secure workplace. Speakers emphasized the need for comprehensive security training programs for new hires, covering topics such as data protection, password hygiene, and recognizing social engineering attempts. Best practices for ongoing education and awareness campaigns were also shared.

It was emphasized that Human Resource Control Security was deemed highly informative and valuable in bridging the gap between HR functions and cybersecurity. It reinforced the idea that human resources are not just personnel management but crucial stakeholders in maintaining a secure organizational environment. As organizations continue to face evolving cyber threats, the seminar served as a catalyst for promoting collaboration between HR and cybersecurity teams. We anticipate that the insights shared will contribute to creating a more resilient and security-aware workforce. Plans for future events and continued collaboration on this critical intersection of HR and security were discussed, reflecting the commitment to ongoing improvement in organizational cybersecurity practices.

On topic 3: The topic began with a comprehensive session on the fundamentals of physical security. Presentations covered the definition of physical security, its objectives, and the role it plays in conjunction with other security domains. Attendees gained insights into the principles of natural surveillance, territorial reinforcement, and access control in the physical security context.

It also explored the role of video surveillance and monitoring in physical security. Attendees learned about the strategic placement of cameras, the integration of surveillance systems with access control, and the use of analytics for proactive threat detection. Discussions also covered the ethical considerations associated with video surveillance in public and private spaces.

On topic 4: The topic began with a foundational session emphasizing the importance of asset management in the context of cybersecurity. Presenters discussed the various types of assets within an organization, ranging from physical devices and infrastructure to digital information and intellectual property. Attendees gained insights into the risks associated with inadequate asset management and the potential impact on overall organizational security.

There was a focused on the process of asset identification and classification. Speakers provided practical guidance on creating and maintaining an inventory of assets, emphasizing the need to categorize them based on their criticality and sensitivity. Discussions covered the challenges associated with asset discovery in dynamic IT environments and strategies to overcome them.

Closing Session:



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The seminar concluded with an open forum to address questions from the participants. The resource speakers provided valuable insights into potential solutions and best practices how to protect from attack and threats (cybedrcrime). The Seminar on Software Development: Issues, Problems, and Challenges was held on December 9, 2023 via Online (Gmeet) The event aimed to bring together professionals, experts, students, and enthusiasts in the field of software development to discuss and address the various challenges and issues faced by the industry. Opening Session:

The keynote speaker, Erwin Exequiel P. Calata, a Software Engineer and a Computer Programmer at the PLGU- Nueva Vizcaya set the tone for the day by discussing the current state of the software development industry and emphasizing the need for continuous adaptation to technological advancements.

The resource speaker discussed the concepts of Software development. He stressed that software development is the process of creating, designing, and programming, testing, and maintaining software applications or systems. It involves a systematic series of steps, known as the software development life cycle (SDLC), which encompasses planning, analysis, design, implementation, testing, deployment, and maintenance.

Throughout the software development process, collaboration among team members, adherence to coding standards, and the use of project management methodologies (such as Agile or Waterfall) play crucial roles in ensuring the success of a software project.



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Software development can range from creating simple scripts for automation to building complex, large-scale applications or systems. It is a dynamic and ever-evolving field, with continuous advancements in technologies, methodologies, and tools.

The resource speaker discussed the software development various domains, each focusing on specific aspects of creating, maintaining, and optimizing software solutions. Here are some key domains within the field of software development:

- 1. Web Development: Front-end Development: Creating the user interface and user experience of websites or web applications using technologies like HTML, CSS, and JavaScript.
- 2. Back-end Development: Building server-side logic, databases, and application architecture to support the functionality of web applications. Common back-end languages include Python, Java, Ruby, and Node.js.
- 3. Mobile App Development: OS Development: Creating applications for Apple's iOS platform using languages like Swift or Objective-C.
- 4. Android Development: Building applications for the Android operating system using Java or Kotlin.
- 5. Desktop Application Development: Developing applications that run on desktop operating systems like Windows, macOS, or Linux. Technologies may include Java, C#, or frameworks like Electron.

- 2. Poor Planning and Estimation: Inaccurate project planning and estimation can lead to missed deadlines and budget overruns. Unrealistic expectations or inadequate resource allocation contribute to project failure.
- 3. Lack of Communication: Poor communication among team members, stakeholders, and different departments can result in misunderstandings, delays, and a lack of alignment between development teams and business objectives.
- 4. Quality Assurance and Testing Challenges: nadequate testing and quality assurance processes can lead to the release of software with defects, resulting in user dissatisfaction and increased maintenance costs.



Narrative

The Department of Psychology, Social Work, and Human Services of the School of Teacher Education and Humanities conducted a resilience program for the inmates of the Nueva Vizcaya Provincial Jail (NVPJ). This is in response a needs analysis survey which showed that persons deprived of liberty (PDLs) of NVPJ have mild to moderate symptoms of depression. The project proposal entitled, "KATATAGAN: A Psychoeducational Resilience Program for Persons Deprived of Liberty at the Nueva Vizcaya Provincial Jail" was submitted to the NVPJ on August 23, 2024, and endorsed to the Governor's Office on August 24, 2023. The Provincial Governor, Atty. Jose V. Gambito, approved the project on September 5, 2024

After project approval, the project implementers provided NVPJ with a poster and sign-up sheet to allow inmates to freely join the program. Forty-four participants signed up for the project.

The project team conducted a meeting on September 7, 2024, at the Guidance and Testing Office to finalize facilitation assignments. Facilitators worked in pairs and assigned to a group of 5-7 inmate participants, as shown below:

The project began on September 14, 2021 with an orientation and pre-program survey attended by the NVPJ Warden, Retired Senior Fire Officer, Mr. Carmelo Andrada, and the PDLs who signed up for the program. The objectives of the session were to: a) introduce the program, b) conduct rapport building activities and float the pre-survey assessing



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depression, anxiety, stress, and coping.

The session began with an opening prayer by Marc Gail Cornejo, MAED GC, and a welcome message from the provincial warden. Mrs. Pearl Via Coballes, the project leader, then presented the objectives of the project. Mr. Reiner Dulawan then facilitated a group dynamic activity to energize the group. After which, participants were assigned to their groups and facilitators proceeded in conducting their respective rapport building activities. The facilitators then discussed he nature of the program by explaining the content of the Group Consent Form and the implications of joining. After this, the participants answered the pre-survey. Final announcements were given and snacks were served. The session ended with a loving kindness meditation exercise at 7:20pm.

The project then proceeded with the delivery of the resilience modules on the following dates:

The ceremony featured an inspiring message from Hon. Eufemia Dacayo, Vice Governor of Nueva Vizcaya. Additionally, as a meaningful gesture, the project team donated books to the local jail as part of the graduation festivities. To conclude the celebration, team members gave dinner packs for the participants.

To assess the outcome of the program, the team conducted a post-survey for the project participants on November 9, 2023. Each group facilitator also gave tokens for their participants and provided snacks.

We conducted consultations with our partner agencies as our initial activities. In September, we had consultations with Atty. Wilma Dulnuan-Binbinon, COMELEC Officer of Bayombong, in our plan to conduct a capacitation seminar for the candidates for SK positions during the election period. She agreed with our project proposal. She also informed us that no COMELEC rules and election laws will be violated in the conduct of the activity. After that, we also proposed the project activities to Mrs. Karla Rollan, the Municipal Local Government Operations Officer of Bayombong. The MLGOO suggested that we propose these activities to Miss Jerlyne Marie Mendoza, the Local Youth Development Officer of this municipality. We had a short meeting with them as part of the planning. During the meeting, two important decisions were made. First, the topics and speakers were identified, such as the history of the SK, leadership and decision-making, ethics and standards for SK, and Election laws, regulations, and updates. Secondly, we explored sources of funding for the capacitation seminar scheduled October 14, 2023, held at Sacred Heart Center of Saint Mary's University. Mayor Antonio Sergio Bagasao pledge to provide the snacks for the participants. The expenses for tarpaulin, certificate holder, tokens for the speakers, and air condition fees for the venue were paid by the team members.

There were 82 candidates for SK positions who attended the capacitation seminar collaboratively organized by COMELEC, MLGOO, LYDO, and SMU, particularly the Social Sciences and Philosophy Department of the School of Teacher Education and Humanities. One of the activities planned by the Department of Social Sciences and Philosophy is the annual Jail Visitation of the Persons Deprived of Liberty at the Solano District Jail located at Barangay Curifang, Solano, Nueva Vizcaya. The activity is one of the scheduled activities of the National Correction Consciousness Month Celebration of the Solano District Jail. It has been the university's commitment to reach out to the jail inmates or Persons Deprived of Liberty. This year, the goal of the jail visitation activity was to contribute to the National Correctional Consciousness Month of the Bureau of Corrections by conducting wellness activities, specifically singing and dancing contests for the PDL of the District Jail, Solano, Nueva Vizcaya. It is our primary objective to contribute to the maintenance of the wellness of the PDL of the district jail, especially those who do not have regular visits.

We coordinated with JO2 Queena de Laza, who is the community relations officer of the Solano District Jail. Jail Warden JSupt Mario Baccay approved our request to conduct the activity in the jail facility.

It was agreed upon by the jail warden that participants will wear face masks and observe other minimum health standards. We targeted all the Persons Deprived of Liberty (PDL) of the jail as beneficiaries; however, due to limited space in the facility for the conduct of the activity, the warden decided to allow only 300 PDL as participants. Unfortunately, at that time, it was raining, so the jail warden allowed only 150 PDL, considering the capacity of their multipurpose shed.

This year's jail visit was spearheaded by the Social Sciences and Philosophy Department in collaboration with the Criminal Justice and Physical Education Departments of the School of Teacher Education and Humanities. The contests held at the activity were solo singing contests, duet singing contests, and hip-hop dance competitions. Guidelines were provided weeks before the activity as preparation for the PDL.

The activity was participated by 12 faculty members and 24 students from the School of Teacher Education and Humanities.

The chapel is expected to be finished by December 16 so that by December 17, the community will have their first mass in their newly built chapel.

- 4. Enhancing Skills and Competence: Providing an avenue for graduate school students to enhance problem-solving skills, organizational and planning skills, and team collaboration, thereby contributing to personal and professional development.

The seminar proved to be a catalyst for cultural awareness and appreciation, allowing participants to develop a robust sense of identity within the Filipino cultural and societal context. The event not only served as a stepping stone for professional development but also earned participants 4 Continuing Professional Development (CPD) merit points, as the seminar was accredited by the Professional Regulation Commission.

In summary, the Seminar-Workshop on Pantayong Pananaw was deemed a resounding success. It not only fulfilled its intended objectives but also became a cornerstone for the continuous pursuit of knowledge, cultural understanding, and professional excellence among the participants. This endeavor stands as a testament to the commitment of Saint Mary's University in fostering an environment that values the richness of Philippine culture and its integration into the broader community.

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

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

Rationale

The Pamaskong Handog activity was initiated to bring joy and warmth to the young pupils of Imugan Elementary School in Sta. The extension activities are as follows:


- Build a Chruch Program at Sitio Pawak, Masoc, Bayombong, N.V.



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

Project SHARE: Soil and H2O Amendments and Restoration Efforts for Sustainable Farming in Dupax del Sur

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Nueva Vizcaya is Cagayan Valley's vegetable capital and the country's next "salad bowl" (Department of Agriculture, 2011). In particular, Dupax del Sur is one of the main vegetable producers. The income of most families is derived from rice farming, onion planting, and vegetable cultivation. Thus, it is inevitable for farmers to use fertilizers to boost crop yield. Farmers across the municipality use a variety of fertilizers to grow crops and to improve and increase the crop yield in every cropping season. Applying these inorganic fertilizers repeatedly for decades pollutes the soil and the water reservoir near it. Excessive use of fertilizers could potentially cause groundwater contamination.

Among the most pervasive pollutants of freshwater globally today are phosphate and nitrate (Khan & Ghouri, 2011). Sources of nitrates include runoff or seepage from fertilized lands, municipal and industrial wastewater, refuse dumps, animal feedlots, septic tanks, private sewage disposal systems, drainages, and decaying plant debris. Nitrates and phosphates are surplus nutrients that contaminate the soil and affect fertility.

The study aimed to raise knowledge and awareness of sustainable farming, considering the conventional means of utilizing fertilizers versus non-conventional ones, which may ensure the soil and water quality that farmers will need to grow their crops. Cajucom, Ahan & Antonio

Project SHARE aimed to disseminate the previous research findings through Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) materials on soil and water amendments.

This utilization project came out of empirical data titled: Assessment of Nitrate and Phosphate Content of Farm Soil and Groundwaters in an Agri-Municipality in Nueva Vizcaya: Basis for MLGU-SMU Restoration Efforts and Eutrophication Control Program.

Water safety and quality are essential, especially to human health, agriculture, aquaculture, industry, and all life forms. Effective crop production depends on an adequate supply of nutrients through fertilizer application to achieve maximum yield. However, soil nutrients need to be appropriately managed to meet the fertility requirements of crops without adversely affecting the quality of our valuable water resources. This research assessed the level of concentration of nitrates and phosphates in farmland soil and groundwater in two selected agro-ecosystem barangays in Dupax del Sur, Nueva Vizcaya, to ascertain the degree of anthropogenic influence via the application of fertilizer and other agro-chemicals to farmlands by farmers. The study shows that the dissolved nitrate concentrations of both irrigation water sources and farmland soils for both barangays are below the recommended levels set by the respective standards referenced in the study - with the data showing no statistically significant difference in nitrate concentrations in the two barangays. Also, the study indicates that the soil phosphate concentrations on all sampled farmlands in both barangays are below the recommended levels set by the standards referenced in the study. However, the dissolved phosphate concentrations in all sampled irrigation water sites are significantly above the recommended levels. The differences in soil and water phosphate concentrations can be due to having a separate irrigation source that has experienced multiple runoffs and leaching events, increasing its dissolved phosphate.

Project SHARE aims to disseminate the research findings to the farmers in the two BLGUs in Dupax del Sur through information, education, and communication (IEC) materials on farm soil and groundwater amendments, specifically on organic farming.

The two neighboring barangays, Mangayang and Gabut, are divided by the Magat River, a stream, and hectares of farmlands owned by both barangay residents. Farming is the main livelihood for almost all families. The farmers from Mangayang are members of the Mangayang-Iñeangan-Duppes Irrigation Association, Inc. The farmlands cover an area from 0.8 hectares (8,000 sq. meters) to 1.5 hectares (15,000 sq. meters) with a mean area of 1.15 hectares (11,500 sq. meters). The common crop planted in Mangayang is sweet potato, commonly called camote. Rice is also grown on two farms, while corn is on one farm. As one farmer shared, camote is a better alternative to rice since the profit is greater, considering the very low price of rice bought by traders. Vegetables such as tomato, pepper, Kentucky beans, string beans, winged beans (pallang), and bottle gourd (upo) are also planted as additional crops. The only farm visited in Gabut is planted with squash and red onions.

The findings of the study were seen as beneficial for the environment and the community. Farmers would become aware of the potential risks of continued usage of inorganic or chemical fertilizers. Hence, they would be encouraged to use alternative fertilizers for more sustainable farming. Concerned government agencies could raise awareness about this phenomenon. This could enable them to devise restoration efforts and formulate eutrophication control programs for affected areas. The researchers also believe that the study would help promote sustainable farming and is also aligned with risk reduction and mitigation, one of the components of SMU's Project WEALTH VERSION 2.0. This academic endeavor was also associated with the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 2, 6, 12, and 13. SDG2 is No hunger: End hunger, achieve food security

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and improved nutrition, and promote sustainable agriculture; SDG6 is Clean Water and Sanitation: Ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all; SDG12 is Responsible Consumption and Production: Ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns; and SDG13 is Climate Action: Take urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts (UN, n.d.).

THE UTILIZATION COMPONENT

Before the research dissemination to the target beneficiaries, the study was presented by Dr. Elsa L. Cajucom at the 10th HCU Thailand e-Conference on June 29, 2023, via Zoom under the Science and Technology cluster.



While waiting for the confirmation of the two barangay captains, the team conducted online research about organic farming. At the same time, one of the researchers gathered insights about organic farming from a professor from a state university. After finalizing the content draft, IEC materials such as a brochure and a poster were crafted using Canva Tools. The researchers worked as a group on the layout and design of the IEC materials.

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Communication letters were given to the two barangays for the proposed schedule of dissemination and distribution of IEC materials among the target farmer-beneficiaries, and upon the confirmation of the two barangays, Team Project SHARE conducted the dissemination and distribution of IEC materials on November 11, 2023. During the onsite activity, an interview was conducted. The sampled farmers were briefly interviewed about organic farming and their insights on the provided IEC materials. In addition, some farmers were also interviewed through brief phone calls conducted in the afternoon after their farm work.

Documentation of Utilization

Crafting and Distribution of Brochures and Posters

Since Mr. Pedro Gudoy, the farm leader of Brgy. Mangayang attended a burial on November 11, 2023, at Brgy. The treasurer received a copy of the research findings, 25 pcs of the brochure, and the poster to be posted in the farmers' venue of their meetings. During the house meeting, the study's findings on the sampled farmlands in their barangay were also discussed. It was explained that the farmers' continuous use of synthetic fertilizers significantly affects the soil quality. Thus, the team advocates the use of organic farming towards sustainable farming.

Meanwhile, the team went to the house of Hon. Jon Agoot, The Brgy. Captain of Gabut distributed the IEC materials and provided a copy of the research findings.

On November 15, 2023, Brgy. Captain Jheremie Mangaong communicated the farmers' request to conduct a short forum on Organic Farming. As an extended activity, Team Project SHARE organized a forum in collaboration with the Department of Agriculture – Nueva Vizcaya.



Green Campus Project

RATIONALE

Saint Mary's University through the years had been one of the advocates for environmental protection. With the mission of "steadfastly participate in the CICM advocacies of promoting multi-ethnicity, social justice, peace, and integrity of God's creation" we have made programs, projects, and activities for the protection of our environment. Two decades ago, the university crafted its CHSF program aimed at practicing what we teach inside the classroom. Our current engagements whether local, national, or international have always had an environmental protection goal.

With the growing environmental concerns, the government had even to enact environmental laws to protect our mother nature. One of these laws is RA 9003. This Act makes provision for efficient solid waste management, for the volume reduction of the waste, its environment-friendly disposal, composting, recycling, re-use, recovery, green charcoal process; for the collection, treatment, and disposal in environmentally sound solid waste management facilities. It aims for the proper segregation, collection, transport, storage, treatment, and disposal of solid waste. It also concerns the protection of groundwater from pollution.

Several higher education institutions had already policies on banning the in-campus use of plastics and even the selling and bringing in of drinks contained in PET bottles which are being implemented religiously. As part of the university's advocacy for promoting the integrity of God's creation, the implementation of our existing laws, and the execution of our programs and projects, this proposal was made and endorsed.

On a personal note, during the Midyear 2022, it was observed that students brought their tumblers. This was due to the fact that most of them were not allowed to go out of campus (limited face-to-face guidelines) and there are limited drinking stations or canteen that sells bottled water or bottled water is expensive for them. This shows that it is possible to ask our students to bring their own drinking tumblers.

OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To manifest our environmental advocacies;
- 2. To show support for our environmental laws;
- 3. To instill among our students the value of protecting the environment; and
- 4. To implement our CHSF program by banning PET bottles and the use of plastics on campus.

OPERATIONALIZATION:

Actions taken:

The proposal was discussed with the Student Central Council and the Student Leaders who are supportive of the proposal.

Actions to be taken (part of our environmental policy/program):

- 1. Disallow use of plastic spoons, forks, disposable plastic food packs, and straws;
- 2. Disallow the entry of drinks using PET bottles;
- 3. Disallow the selling of drinks on PET bottles (to be part of the contract among Canteen Concessionaires); and
- 4. Symposium on environmental protection by LMCDAC or office handling the CHSF program (and to explain the move by the university).

Consequences of the actions to be taken:

- 1. Require students to use tumblers or any non-PET drinking utensils.
- 2. Require canteen concessionaire to provide a drinking station.
- 3. Require concessionaires to use only paper cups, lunch packs, and silver utensils for food.
- 4. The university provides water drinking stations (revive the old drinking fountain or purchase new ones to be stationed in strategic places).

OPPORTUNITIES:

- 1. For mass reproduction by TTBDO of SMU labeled tumblers for sale;
- 2. The tumblers themselves as promotional materials;
- 3. Inculcation to the Marian community of our responsibility toward the environment.
